

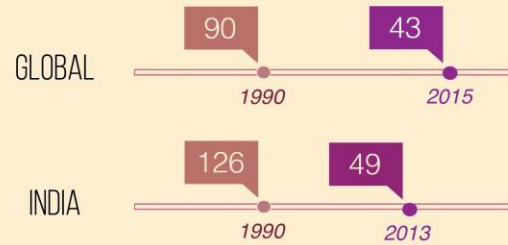

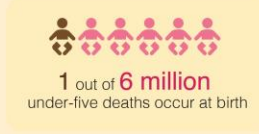
Millennium Development Goal 4:

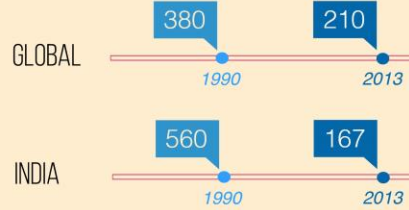
In 2015, globally, almost 16,000 children under five died every day  
Most of them died from preventable causes: pneumonia, diarrhoea and malaria



# ENDING PREVENTABLE MATERNAL DEATHS

Millennium Development Goal 5: Reduce the maternal mortality ratio by three quarters, between 1990 and 2015

THESE COMPLICATIONS CAN BE PREVENTED OR MANAGED BY INTERVENTIONS SUCH AS



- Haemorrhage stands as the cause of the greatest number of maternal deaths
- Other major complications: infections, high blood pressure during pregnancy, complications from delivery and unsafe abortion

- Antenatal care in pregnancy
- Skilled care during childbirth
- Care and support in the six weeks after childbirth
- Preventing teenage pregnancies
- Access to contraception

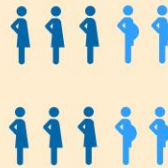
Worldwide:



One in two pregnant women receive the recommended amount of antenatal care



One in four babies are delivered without skilled care



Six out of 10 women (15-49 years) have access to contraceptives
